# MINUTES

# 1. WELCOME AND APOLOGIES

Chairman John Henderson welcomed all to the 1<sup>st</sup> Annual General Meeting of the Caithness & North Sutherland Fund. The Chairman explained the format of the AGM in terms of the formal business items of its members and also further explained that it was also an open public meeting to enable the Fund to report to the Caithness & North Sutherland Community on its activities throughout the year as well as to seek the views of the Community regarding the Funds performance.

Apologies were received from CNSF Directors Cllr Linda Munro and Shona Munro.

# 2. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman presented the following report at the meeting and copies of the Chairman's Report were distributed. A statistical report of the Fund activity was also distributed at the meeting. (See appendix 1)

# CHAIRMANS REPORT

# Introduction

This being the first AGM of the Caithness and North Sutherland Fund, it seems appropriate to tell you a little of how the Fund came into being, and what it seeks to achieve.

The Caithness & North Sutherland fund was established by the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority and Dounreay Site Restoration Ltd. Its remit is to distribute funding to community organisations for projects that will increase the attractiveness of Caithness & North Sutherland as a place to live, work and invest. Particular emphasis is placed on achieving environment, social, cultural and infrastructure improvements.

The funding package was agreed as part of the development of a new disposal facility for low-level waste from decommissioning Dounreay.

The NDA will provide £4M to the fund - £1m has been provided in late 2011, and £300,000 will be provided in 2014 and each year until 2023.

# Who we are

Caithness and North Sutherland Fund is a company limited by guarantee, with seven Directors. Four of these Directors are appointed from the general public in the area through an open recruitment process, and three are appointed by the Highland Council.

The four appointed Directors are myself, Koreen MacDougall, Frances Gunn and Shona Munro. These four Directors were appointed by the NDA, with the assistance of the Dounreay Stakeholder Group, through an open recruitment process for a three year term. The three Highland Council Directors are Cllr John Rosie, Cllr Gail Ross and Cllr Linda Munro.

I believe that we have an excellent Board of Directors who are clear about what they are doing, and committed to seeing that the Fund achieves the best possible impact on community development in the area.

The other key person is our Co-ordinator, David Shearer. We are very fortunate to have the services of David, who has done an outstanding job in helping applicants and ensuring that the applications coming to the Board are clear and well thought through.

## What we do

Essentially we give money to community and voluntary organisations. We consider applications of up to £30,000 of assistance to projects that will provide significant community benefit.

## How we do it

The Board of the Fund meet quarterly to consider applications. In doing this we are joined by observers from NDA and DSRL, currently Anna MacConnell and Mary-Jane Statham. This ensures that our processes and decisions are consistent with the socio-economic policies of those organisations.

I do not propose to go through the application process and eligibility criteria in detail today; these are clearly outlined on our website and individual queries can be answered

by the Co-ordinator. We do believe in helping and guiding applicants, especially those with limited experience of managing projects, to achieve the best possible application. A substantial part of David's time is spent on this. Our other guiding principle is flexibility; we have no rigid rules, and are determined to ensure that good quality projects do receive support.

The quarterly application rounds are competitive, and we have various criteria by which we judge applications. It is the case that we cannot support every application we receive. However, the overriding consideration is the degree of community benefit which we feel the project will deliver.

Throughout the process of applications, awards and claims we endeavour to make life as uncomplicated as possible for applicants, and I believe that all those we have dealt with so far have appreciated David's efforts to see that this is the case.

# What we have done in the past year

David has prepared a report which is available, giving details of what we have done in the past year. I would just highlight a few of the relevant features.

- Projects with a total value of over £1.2m have been supported with £273k of CNSF funding.
- These projects are well distributed geographically throughout the area.
- The projects cover an impressive range of activities

# **Conclusion**

In its first year I think the Fund has quickly found its feet, and has made a substantial impact on community projects in Caithness and North Sutherland. I am confident that we can build on this, and be a key player in helping to develop the area - meeting our objective of making Caithness and North Sutherland an attractive place to live and work.

In closing, there are many people to thank in getting the Fund up and running. Firstly, my fellow directors for their support and very positive approach to the work of the Fund. Also, in the formative stages we were very grateful for the help and advice from DSRL, particularly Marie Mackay and Philip Colville. In addition, the former Highland Council nominees, ClIr David Flear and ClIr Robbie Rowantree, played a key part in getting us started. All these people deserve credit for what the Fund has achieved, but the crucial link in all this, the person who actually does the work, has been our Co-ordinator, David Shearer. He has been enormously effective in guiding applicants, looking after the business, and supporting the Board.

John Henderson CNSF Chairman 26<sup>th</sup> October 2012 Following the Chairman's Report, the Chairman then invited discussion from the floor and the main points of the discussion were noted as;

It was stated that the Caithness & North Sutherland Fund has evidenced working very well and has been effective in its activities.

Some concerns were raised as to the considerable sums of community benefit funds becoming available in the Caithness & North Sutherland Area following recent press coverage reporting of a community benefit fund experiencing difficulties in attracting applicants. It was felt that this evidenced that the community is not getting the maximum benefit from the available funds and perhaps there could be an opportunity for the Caithness & North Sutherland Fund to act as a catalyst to facilitate or assist in achieving a more joint up approach with the other community benefit funds in the Caithness & North Sutherland area.

Chairman John Henderson responded stating that the Caithness & North Sutherland Fund was aware when first established that there were a number of community benefit funds becoming available in the area and agreed that it would be of benefit to both the community and the various community funds if a more joined up approach could be looked at, as well as ensuring that both funding criteria and geographical criteria met demand.

The Chairman also stated that this issue would be discussed in more detail with the Caithness & North Sutherland Fund Board.

# 3. AUDITORS REPORT & ACCOUNTS FOR ADOPTION

Copies of the signed Report of the Directors and Financial Accounts for the Period 27<sup>th</sup> April 2011-31<sup>st</sup> March 2012 were distributed at the meeting and were presented by the Fund Coordinator. *(See appendix 2)*


# Caithness & North Sutherland Fund Statistical Report October 2011-12

## Summary

Since launching in October 2011 the Fund has processed a total of 68 online enquiry forms and from this has allocated 60 application forms to eligible groups. The Caithness & North Sutherland Fund Community Benefit Package Committee has held three assessment meetings to date and has assessed 28 funding applications awarding funding assistance to 23 groups.

The Fund has awarded a total of £273,167.86 to projects that will benefit people living in the Dounreay travel to work area. This awarded funding is projected to attract a total funding leverage sum of £815,821.60. The awarded projects also evidences attracting a substantial in kind contribution from the community and voluntary groups which is valued at £138,831.32.
